






Piedmont Division 2020 Wrap Up And Awards







2020 Virtual Piedmont Pilgrimage Is A Global Success



Overcoming the substantial challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, the 18th Annual Piedmont Pilgrimage of 2020 successfully met its objective to provide opportunities for the general public to tour many of our Division's

layouts, albeit virtually online as pre-recorded video presentations. With 47 of our modelers participating as video hosts (three as first-time "layout exhibitors" for the Pilgrimage), we recorded at least 37,769 total "views" on the Division's YouTube Channel (through 1/1/21), just for those 47 layout tour videos alone. This represents an average of over 803 views per video. The total "watch time" was reported at well over 4300 hours.

Video views were reported from all over the globe, with about 10% from outside of North America (i.e., the US and Canada). The UK and Australia were very well represented, but we also had well over a hundred views each from Germany and New Zealand. In all, we had over 4630 international views from 12 different countries.

Forty six of the videos remain available on YouTube and through our website <u>www.piedmontpilgrimage.com</u>. One video was taken offline as of 1/1/21, at the request of the owner. Many of these videos continue to add a few more views every day.

During the Pilgrimage event, we also presented a couple of interactive "Host Q&A" sessions via YouTube Live. The first one with Tom Klimoski went very well, and had as many as 50 online participants, thanks in large part to his existing community of followers online. The second one with Jerry Michnewicz was a valiant effort, but had a few technical issues, and was only lightly attended. Recordings for both are still available on YouTube. My special thanks to both of our Q&A hosts, and also to Tom Gordon and Jim Foley for taking care of the logistics for these events.

We also want to thank all of our video layout tour hosts. Many of them shot their own video, and some even produced the complete video for us. This was all very helpful. The Pilgrimage participation "stars" for 2020 were mailed out to our hosts recently.

As I've said before, putting this all together was truly a team effort. Once again, I would like to recognize and thank the members of the Pilgrimage Committee for their very significant contributions of time and talents. Special recognition goes to Craig Knox, who personally worked on more than half of all our videos in some way as a videographer and/or editor.

Getting Wired

WITH TOM GORDON

INTERESTING NEW STUFF

I've found several new technology developments that might be of interest to folks in the division. These stand out, in my opinion, as significant. Yes, there other new tech things happening, but since I'm a bit biased regarding railroad tech, I'll list my top 3 favorite big deals.

NEW TURNOUTS

OK, you may say turnouts are not technical, but when you consider how they interact with all the other technology on a layout, they really are!

PECO has released its UNIFROG TURNOUTS, and they, in my opinion, are real winners. Previously one had to choose between insulated frogs (about 1" of dead rail), and ELECTROFROG which required current routing to the frog. Personally, I took what was in stock, and if I had to power the frog separately, that was OK. The INSULFROG turnouts were easier to install since I don't have any real short wheelbase engines that would make the insulated section a problem. I always had to electrically connect the points to the closure rails with a soldered wire no matter which style was used.

The new universal frog (UNIFROG) turnouts allow the user to choose whether or not to power the frog. The powered frog section is only about 1/4" long, and is



wired to the wing rails. These can easily be left unpowered, unless an engine has only one pickup wheel per side. If powering the frog is critical, Peco provides a lead to connect the power source. The ability to install these without modification is a huge technical improvement to me!

This is all well and good, but the big item I like is that they eliminated the joint between the points and the closure rails. There is one piece of rail between the frog and the points, allowing for good electrical continuity. Each closure rail is powered the same as its adjacent stock rail. For me, this is a big deal, since I was forever rewiring the turnouts on the workbench, electrically connecting the closure and stock rails, while installing a jumper between the points and closure rails. That's the good news. The bad news is that I've just about finished buying and laying track, so I won't be able to take advantage of this new feature. Oh well.

NEW ELECTRONICS

For those a bit adventurous, there is a bit of new technology in the DCC and Arduino space, as several folks have developed a set of software called DCC++. It allows one to convert an ARDUINO MEGA (cost: about \$15) into a DCC command station. It is an open source DCC system that is being updated and improved every day. There is need for power boosters with this system, but the basic station is cheap. It all runs off JMRI, which allows the use of cell phones and other generic hardware as WiFi throttles.

This is for those that are willing to do some experimentation, but it is likely the direction of the DCC technology. As small electronics become cheaper, applications like DCC will follow suit, and more 'generic' systems will become available.

This is a developing technology, and as time goes on, more improvements and features will be introduced. The concept of manufacturer based DCC will continue to exist for a long time, but as developments occur in the open-source community, more and more users will be using the more affordable and flexible systems.

LocoFi

You've all heard of dead rail, and that's an interesting concept. While I'll admit it's not for me, there are similar technologies that are evolving that I find even more enticing. One to watch is LocoFI. This technology allows running of an engine from your phone, without intervening DCC. The engine is apparently just another device that can be contacted via WiFi, powered by whatever you have on the rails. It can also be supplemented with current storage devices to allow running on tracks with large unpowered areas.


The LocoFi decoders all have sound, and the firmware updates can be done via microSD cards. Currently the decoders don't have all the features of more complex ones but given time new features will likely happen.

LocoFi is interesting because the manufacturer is keeping the sound files open (not proprietary) and the system allows the ability to update the loco software and sounds wirelessly. One can upload custom sounds to a decoder to match whatever prototype is needed. You can have a separate router to control your layout, disconnected from your home WiFi, allowing folks to use your layout's WiFi system without compromising your home network. This is a very good idea!

The LocoFi system runs in conjunction with DCC, allowing the DCC to power the track, while the control is done via WiFi. Also, and this is big, if one does not want to convert a layout to DCC from DC, individual loco control can be accomplished via LocoFi without modifying existing power sources. Engines with this technology can also physically run on the same track as DCC and DC powered engines.

I haven't tried LOCOFI out, but it appears to be a rather enticing technology... and yes, it'll be on my Christmas wish list in the future, as the idea of trying this out sounds fun!

That's all the new stuff that I have for now and have Happy Holidays, a Merry Christmas, and a great virus-free New Year!

A QUICK AND EASY JIG TO PAINT N GAUGE WHEELS

In April of 2015, BROADWAY LIMITED IMPORTS introduced ARA 70-ton 4 bay hoppers in N Gauge. The prototypes were built between 1926 and 1930 and primarily hauled coal. These were perfect to supply my pre-WW II Milwaukee Road which is dominated by steam power. I bought all three of the six packs of unique road numbers BLI offered for the MILW.



The cars are beautifully detailed and run well, but running shiny, spotless coal hoppers looks extremely un-

natural. This and a future article will show how I weathered these cars. I will work from the bottom up, starting with the wheels.

I am familiar with the painting masks offered by AMERICAN MODEL BUILDERS for HO wheels, but could not find anything similar for N Gauge. I did not think holding each wheel in a clamp or between fingers would be practical. I imagined spending a lot of my time searching for wheel sets that fat, clumsy fingers would fling everywhere.

Having a paint mask would be ideal, but the engineering was more than I wanted to commit to designing and building. I decided just having a jig to secure the wheels would be a major convenience, especially if it could hold enough wheels for several cars at a time.

I had some Evergreen Scale Models .125" x .250" strip styrene onhand and saw that the axles were slightly longer than the larger width. These hoppers had 33" wheels as do most of my 36' and 40' period box cars and reefers. This meant two strips could be the bread in a wheel sandwich that held several sets of wheels and hold the flanges above the work surface. Perfect!

I found two pieces that were about 8" long and marked one to hold

12 axles. These were separated into 3 sets of 4 axles .250" apart which is 40 scale-inches. I left sufficient space on each end to serve as a handle.



There is no need to mark the second piece. Simply clamp and tightly tape the two pieces together.


Note that one end is longer than the other. This means the jig can only be assembled one way and eliminates the need for precision when cut-



ting notches to hold the axles in the jig.


I used a small angle plate to guide a razor saw at each mark to make a shallow kerf across both pieces. This was followed by a triangular jeweler's file to expand the channel to about one-third the diameter of the axle. Hold the file level—the width of the channel should be the same size on the front of the first piece and the back of the second. This notch holds the wheel in place while assembling the two halves. That's it!


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JIG TO PAINT N GAUGE WHEELS (CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS PAGE)





Before using, attach masking tape to the bottom half. This makes it easier to put the jig together. Place the other half on top and start wrapping the tape around the assembly.



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I am not worried about

painting the backs of the wheel as they are difficult to see in this scale.

COCC



The eighteen hoppers will be arbitrarily split into three groups by car number. The lowest numbers will receive the heaviest weathering, the highest the least and the balance somewhere in between. I want each train to have cars with a variety of looks.

I used AK CRUSTED RUST DEPOSITS for the wheel faces. This set includes three enamel paints that range from a fresh orangey rust to a dark brown aged color. It has a very fine grit that adds a subtle texture that seems appropriate for this gauge.









After the paint dried, a pencil eraser easily removed paint from the flange and tread as well as the points at the end of the axle.

This jig takes almost no effort to make but provides an easy way to weather these small wheels. The next issue will show how I weathered the trucks and hopper bodies.

Achievement Program News



Recent Awards

Raymond Stewart has earned Merit Awards for three pieces of scratch-built trackwork. The three pieces consist of a #6 turnout, a gauntlet track, and a gauntlet turnout. He hand-laid each of the three pieces in HO scale using code 83 rail. These Merit fill one of the requirements for the certificate you must have an operable wye, reversing loop, turntable, or transfer table. This particular individual already has a wye, reversing loop, and a turntable on this layout. He overlooked the word "or" on the reguirement. Don't make the tasks any harder than necessary.

Awards fulfill one of the requirements for the AP Civil Certificate.

Merit Award Judging

If you have been working on structures, scratch-building rolling stock or track pieces, or completing your layout scenery and would like to have something judged for Merit Awards, contact me. I will arrange for a team of judges to meet you at a mutually agreeable location. You do not have to wait for a model contest. Raymond Stewart recently contacted me about judging his trackwork and we were able to set up the judging within a week's time.

Some Thoughts, Hints, and Suggestions on Earning AP Certificates

In 2019 the NMRA changed some of the requirements for a few of the AP Certificates. One change was the elimination

of the duplicate forms that once were required. They also changed the judging requirements that pertained to the scratchbuilt track pieces required for the AP Civil Certificate. Now each piece of trackwork is judged on three categories -- construction, scratch-build, and conformity to NMRA standards -- on a PASS / FAIL basis.

You can get full information about all the certificates and their requirements and download the required forms on the NMRA website. Click on "Education" and then go to "Achievement Program". Read the requirements closely. One Piedmont Division member recently contacted me with a question about the Electrical Certificate. His query centered on the need for a transfer table. To ful-



More Piedmont Division members have earned the Association Volunteer Certificate than any other certificate. This certificate recognizes your service to the NMRA, not your modeling skills. To earn the certificate one must accumulate 60 points. Points are awarded for being an open house host, serving as an open house operator associate, being a division officer or committee member, giving a clinic, serving as a contest judge. Download the required form and start keeping track of points as you earn them. You may be surprised that in several years of service you have earned the required points. It is far easier to keep track of points as you earn them compared to remembering what you did five or ten years ago.

The most popular certificates after Association Volunteer are Scenery and Electrical. You can find a list of all Piedmont Di-

vision certificate holders on the Division's website. Just go to "Education" and then "Achievement Program". Just below the photograph of some of the Division's MMRs there is a link to the spreadsheet showing who has earned what certificates. Use that list to get some advice or help, if you need it.

Talk to any of the Division's MMRs. They will tell you that working on achievement certificates increased their modeling skills and greatly improved their layouts. In some cases it forced them out of their comfort zones to learn new skills.


Third Place — Prototype (tie)

First Place - Model and Best in Show








Second Place — Model







